

Alvear Is Simply as Anti Gay as the Anti Gays

I read Michael Alvear's column in your April 9th issue, and then cross referenced it with some of the antigay propaganda on the Web. Would it surprise you that there were striking resemblance's?

"Gay men are obsessed with physical appearance making vanity and superficiality hallmarks of their culture."

"Gay men are the most promiscuous segment of our society, making sexually transmitted diseases and unstable relationships one of the observable hallmarks of their culture.

Alvear's use of the First Amendment, Free Speech, as a defense against his critics is the same refuge taken by the most vociferous opponents of equal rights for all people. What he should have done in his latest column, was to apologize for the insult that he delivered to Lesbians in his previous

I believe that Alvear, as an editorial columnist for a Gay and Lesbian community newspaper, has an obligation to the community he serves to try to debunk myths and generalizations, stereotypes and labels. Or, if he is going to espouse them, then he should very clearly state that he is expressing his opinion, and not fact.

Regarding lesbians and the visual arts: There a number of famous lesbian visual artists who have had significant influence on painting and photography: Alice Austen, Bernice Abbot, Romaine Brooks, Louise Bourgoise, and Mary Cassatt, to name just a few. No, they are not pop icons, but, their contribution to the arts is probably more significant. Furthermore, there are numerous organizations, worldwide, for the promotion of lesbian visual artists. And, we shouldn't forget that countless lesbians are involved in the theater, television and movies in lighting, set design and props. Perhaps, Alvear should explore why these legions of artists are unknown to us. That, would be a service to his readers!

As for his statements about gays: While certain segments of the gay population may be more preoccupied with physical appearance, and, perhaps a more visible segment of the gay population, the vast majority of gay men are probably no more vain than most men in our culture. Rather than making that silly statement, Alvear might explore how a minority that is defined by its sexual behavior might place greater importance on sexual attractiveness.

According to most studies, men are more promiscuous than women, single men are more promiscuous than married men. And, gay men, who have no societal support for long-term loving relationships, may be the most promiscuous of all. Perhaps, Alvear should explore whether promiscuity causes unstable relationships, or lack of societal support for men loving men facilitates sexual promiscuity. Or, Alvear might investigate whether it is promiscuous sexual behavior that promotes disease versus unsafe sexual behavior. They are not the same thing!

When a person of any race makes the statement that "blacks are better than whites in sports, because there are more blacks in professional sports," it is as misguided as saying that "white males make better CEOs because most CEOs are white males."

Whether these statements are called "generalizations," or they are called stereotypical thinking, they are wrong. And, they are wrong because they are based on subjective observation. Or, they make a cause and effect leap of faith with unsubstantiated underpinnings. Provocation is not responsible journalism. It incites anger and resentment. Responsible journalism gives us insight and perspective. I believe that Alvear owes us all an apology, not for his callousness, or insensitivity, but for shallow, sloppy and superficial journalism.
